#### A. Personal Statement

I am a Researcher at the Southcentral Foundation, and my research focuses on diet, nutrition, traditional ecological knowledge, epidemiology, decision-making, and building psychological and health related resilience in Indigenous communities. I have a background in Anthropology, with specific training in community-based participatory research (CBPR), ethnographic research, and qualitative and quantitative data analysis. As an accomplished researcher, I have designed and conducted studies in a variety of healthcare settings. For my master's research, I conducted research on medical pluralism in Morocco and developed an ethnographic decision-making model. To develop the ethnographic decision-making model (EDM), key informant interviews were combined with data collected from 15 informants in a series of 5 interviews that took place over a 10-month period. The qualitative interviews were used to construct an EDM for treatment choice. To evaluate the EDM, case histories were collected from 62 households monthly over a 6-month period (October 2011 to March 2012). Based on the data from case histories, participants' treatment choices were highly dependent on the cost and access to treatment. Final reports were disseminated to the Peace Corps host country staff and the Ministry of Health. The goal of providing this information was to improve biomedical programs and services available to rural cities and towns. My dissertation focused on diet and nutrition among the Confederated Tribes of the Chehalis Reservation. The purpose of this study was to explore the relationship between cultural practices and perceptions of nutritional health. I collected 40 interviews between September and December 2018. Correlation tables and logistic regression models (full model and stepwise model) were used to understand the data and the findings indicated 1.) growing up on the reservation lowered the chances of someone reporting a nutritional illness; 2.) as participant's age increased, the likelihood they reported a nutritional illness increased; 3.) selfreported exercise was negatively correlated with nutritional illness; and 4.) having a family member that suffered from a nutrition related illness increased the likelihood of that person reporting a nutrition related illness. The dissertation and results were used to inform the tribe's food sovereignty initiative. I have three years of experience working at the Washington State University Institute for Research and Education to Advance Community Health (IREACH). As a Senior Social Scientist, I coordinated and managed several NIH-funded studies collaborating with American Indians. In addition, I was responsible for recruitment, consenting, data collection, data management, coding, and dissemination of results. Currently, I have two peer-reviewed

publications and I am working on manuscripts for several peer-reviewed publications. In summary, I have the skills, expertise, and experience to conduct the proposed research project.
